

Leading Entomologist Attacks Anti-DDT Genocidalists

Jan. 24, 2011—The world's leading expert on DDT has just launched a bold attack on the genocide lobby's efforts to stop the use of DDT and other pesticides to control malaria.

Entomologist Donald Roberts and co-author Richard Tren's paper, published in the current issue of *Research and Reports in Tropical Medicine*, documents how environmental groups and United Nations agencies are spending millions of dollars to try to prove the unprovable: that malaria can be controlled without pesticides, specifically without DDT.

The aim of these groups, including the United Nations Environment Program, the Stockholm Convention Secretariat, and the Global Environment Facility (GEF), is to phase out DDT production by 2017 and its use by 2020. In other words, they intend to kill people by eliminating the most effective pesticide against malaria.

DDT was banned in the United States in 1972 by the same Malthusian lobby, precisely because it was so successful in stopping malaria and allowing population to increase in the developing sector. DDT is long-lasting, cheap, and, unlike newer pesticides, it repels mosquitoes; most mosquitoes will not enter a sprayed house. DDT use made a slight comeback in 2006, when the World Health Organization reversed its DDT ban and permitted its use for malaria control; but the genocide lobby again geared up its propaganda to stop developing nations from using DDT.

The new Roberts and Tren article, "International advocacy against DDT and other public health insecticides for malaria control,"¹ documents how the anti-DDT lobby's studies, which claim a reduction in malaria of 63 percent in eight countries using "non-chemical methods," are an unscientific sham. The much publicized "reduction" was not measured against the control areas in those countries, or against countrywide malaria efforts and results.

As authors Donald Roberts and Richard Tren conclude: "malaria will not be defeated by claims of success when no successes have been achieved. However, it can be contained and perhaps eradicated if all available tools, to include DDT, are made available and employed in an organized and systematic way."
